

# Why a 4-H Fair?

The primary purpose of the Monmouth County 4-H Fair is to give our boys and girls an opportunity to exhibit items which they have made, reared, or grown as a part of their 4-H project work.

These exhibits are evaluated by competent experts in their respective fields and appropriate ratings given to each article. The blue, red, yellow, or white ribbons indicate to the club member how good a job he or she has done with his particular project. This is our way of indicating to the club member how improvements can be made and at the same time rewarding them for a job well done.

While it's nice for a club member to receive a blue ribbon - "excellent", it is more important that club members participate in the 4-H Fair and have their articles evaluated so that they might improve and become more proficient in their skills in home making, agriculture and crafts.

# 4-H Judging Methods

In 4-H Club work, all articles are judged by the Danish system - that is, judging to a standard. In this way, all items if scored between 90 and 100 points according to the standard for the particular article, it rates "excellent". Those rating between 80 and 89 a "very good". Those between 70 and 79 a "good", and those from 60 to 69 a "fair". Unworthy exhibits are disquallified.

#### What Is The 4-H Organization?

4-H Club work is the largest organization of boys and girls in America. There are nearly two and a half million 4-H members who belong to more than 94,200 local cubs. In Monmouth County there are over 600 members belonging to 40 clubs. More than 21,000,000 young people have taken part in this "learn by doing" program and have subscribed to the National 4-H motto, "to make the best better."

4-H Clubs are the official youth program of the Cooperative Extension Service of Rutgers, The State University. This program is financed jointly by federal, state, and county governments. On the county level the program is supervised by one or more 4-H Club agents. Adult volunteer leaders serve as advisors and instructors for each local 4-H Club.

### What Is a 4-H Club — What Does a 4-H Club Do?

A 4-H Club is an organized group of five or more boys and/or girls, 9 to 19 years of age, who are interested in improving themselves, their homes, and their communities through educational and recreational projects. A 4-H Club emphasizes training for service through the use of Head, Heart, Hands, and Health.

The members elect their own officers; develop a club program; hold regular meetings, using parliamentry procedure; and learn to function democratically. Educational programs and recreation are important phases of 4-H meetings.

#### Who May Become a 4-H Member?

Any girl or boy between the ages of 9 and 19 may become a 4-H member. A member must attend club meetings regularly, complete at least one 4-H project, keep project records, learn to give demonstrations, and exhibit their results at county or local shows. Members must finance their own projects. Faithful club meeting attendance and good project work are extremely important for a successful 4-H career.

#### Who Are 4-H Leaders?

4-H Club leaders are men and women who volunteer their time in the interest of helping boys and girls. Adult leaders receive training in 4-H organization and subject matter. Training meetings are conducted by the county 4-H agents and specialists from Rutgers University.

Each local 4-H Club has at least one organizational or key leader. Most clubs also have one or more assistant or project leaders.

#### What Is a 4-H Project?

The 4-H project is a challenge. Members choose one or more projects from 50 different subjects. Each project has a list of requirements which the members must satisfactorily complete in order to receive credit. Local leaders guide members in the selection of their projects.

#### Opportunities Offered to 4-H Members

4-H members learn to work and play together in a club group. They develop a real sense of values through their projects. Members receive practical training resulting in skill and knowledge which may help them in choosing a career. 4-H'ers learn to practice good citizenship, good sportsmenship, and are given an opportunity to develop their leadership talents.

4-H'ers may attend 4-H Camp at Stokes State Forest near Branchville, N. J. Outdoor living helps to broaden their experiences and develops and understanding of the forces of nature. A program of varied activities including crafts, conservation, boating, swimming, archery, firearms safety, sports, outdoor cookery, and a variety of evening programs is provided.

Teen-age boys and girls may serve as junior leaders and may become members of the 4-H Council. Those who do excellent work are eligible for state contests and exhibits as well as trips and scholarships. All 4-H members are better equipped for adult life because of their project training and democratic club meetings.

#### How to Start a 4-H Club

The basic requirements for starting a 4-H Club is a minimum of five members and at least one responsible adult as the 4-H leader. It is preferable, however, to start with a larger group of members and with the sponsorship of a local organization such as a PTA, service club, etc. Small clubs usually meet in homes. Larger groups will need a school, municipal hall, or other public meeting place.



### HOME ECONOMICS EXTENSION PROGRAM

Classes are free and available to the homemakers of Monmouth County in the following areas of home economics: Foods and Nutrition, Clothing and Textiles, Home Furnishing, Home Management, and Human Relations. Each year a Home Economics program is printed and will be mailed to you free upon request.

The Home Economis Extension Program is carried on by:

- Volunteer Leaders In order to make this information available to the largest number of homemakers, class members are supplied with educational materials and are taught to pass this knowledge on to a group of friends, a church or club group, or an organization. All training is given by a Rutgers Specialist or the Home Agent.
- 2. **Home Agent** The Home Agent is a graduate home economist and a member of the faculty of Rutgers, The State University who guides the county Home Economics Program.
- 3. **Monmouth County Home Economics Extension Council** This is a group of interested homemakers from different areas of the county who serve in an advisory capacity in the planning and execution of the program under the direction of the Home Agent.



# COUNTY 4-H FAIR

# JULY 18 - 19 - 20 FREEHOLD RACEWAY

The main objective of the Fair is to give boys and girls an opportunity to display the results of their year's 4-H project work - to have it fairly judged or evaluated so that they might improve themselves and their projects for another year and hence live up to the 4-H motto, "To make the best better".

All boys and girls enrolled in 4-H clubs in Monmouth County during the year are eligible to exhibit articles which they have made, grown, or reared as a 4-H project this year. It is hoped that every 4-H member will avail himself to the opportunity he or she has to exhibit their best projects in this year's Fair.

### GENERAL RULES

Listed below are the 1963 4-H Fair entry rules and regulations:

- 1. Each exhibitor must be an active 4-H club member.
- 2. All exhibits must be the results of the current year's 4-H Project work in the unit enrolled, and must have been grown, owned or made by the club member.
- 3. The 4-H exhibit tag must be secured from your leader and club agent. Instead of county, give club name. Please Print.
- 4. Record books completed to date must be shown by members exhibiting to their respective leaders.
- 5. All entries not meeting class requirements as listed will be disqualified.
- 6. Each leader must turn in certification sheet of member's eligibility to 4-H Office by July 15.
- 7. Exhibits may not be removed until 10:00 p.m. Saturday, July 20. Livestock may not be removed until 8:30 p.m. Saturday, July 20.

### **SPECIAL ENTRY RULES:**

- 1. All clothing entries will be judged according to the clothing schedule made known to 4-H club leaders in June. All clothing entries to receive awards must be exhibited at the 4-H Fair.
- 2. Food Preparation, Vegetables, Flowers, Indoor Gardening, Propagation and other perishable entries must be brought to the Fairgrounds before 11:00 a.m. on Wednesday July 17. No entries will be accepted after 11:00 a.m.
- 3. Forestry, Shopwork, Electrical, Automotive, Crafts, Entomology and Child Care entries must be brought to the Fairgrounds between the hours of 10:00 a.m. and 5:00 p.m. on Monday, July 15.
- 4. Livestock, Poultry, and Rabbit exhibitors must have all entries at the Fairgrounds before 12:00 noon, Thursday, July 18.
- 5. Dairy, Horse, Beef, and Sheep entry forms must be submitted to the county 4-H office before July 1. No late entries accepted.
- 6. 4-H Fashion Revue rehearsal Friday, July 19 9:30 a.m., Fairgrounds (all girls eligible).

# **AWARDS**

- 1. All exhibits will be judged by the Danish System.
- 2. Ribbons will be awarded to those placing "Excellent, Very Good, Good and Fair."
- 3. A club member may receive but one cash award in a class.
- 4. The judges may disqualify any entry not meeting requirements listed in schedule.

### SPECIAL AWARDS

Special awards for outstanding exhibitors are provided in all major projects, and in many of the new projects. Awards will be announced and presented at the Special Awards Program on Saturday, July 20, 9:00 p.m. following the 4-H Fashion Revue.

### JUDGES

Competent judges will be selected by the local club leaders with the approval of the County Club Agent, and all decisions of the judges are final.

# HOME ECONOMICS

# PROJECTS

# Food Preparation

Designed to build a basic knowledge of food preparation methods, menu planning, and food judging standards. Projects progress from simple-to-make recipes to the more difficult preparations.

#### UNIT 1 - What's Cooking?

(First year - Beginning Cooking)

#### Requirements:

 Prepare satisfactorily at least one food from the following sections:

Cookies, Sandwiches, etc.

Give at least one club demonstration and, if possible, demonstrate at the county demonstration contest.

 Show what you have learned by planning, preparing, and serving to your family a Sunday morning breakfast or a Saturday or Sunday night supper.

4. Keep record book up to date.

Start a card file or book for recipes.

6. Exhibit food products at County 4-H Fair.

#### UNIT II - Let's Have a Picnic.

(Second year - Intermediate Food Preparation)

#### Requirements:

 Prepare satisfactorily at least one food from each of the following sections:

Beverages, main dishes, salads, etc.

Give one or more demonstrations: one of which is at the county demonstration contest.

 Help plan and do the food shopping, preparation, and serving; or help with clean-up job for at least 4 of the 5 meals listed in project book.

 Show what you have learned by planning, preparing, and serving your family or a group of friends an informal meal as a "windup" achievement.

5. Keep record book up to date and add to recipe file.

6. Exhibit food products from this unit at County 4-H Fair.

#### UNIT III - "The Dinner Bell Rings"

(Third year — Advanced Food Preparation)

#### Requirements:

 Learn Cooking and Preparation of Meats, Poultry, Fish, Pies, Cakes, Yeast breads.

 Using Food Selection Score Card, score your dinners for a week at the beginning of this unit and again at the end of this unit to see if you are eating the foods needed by your body.

 Give at least one demonstration at a club meeting and/or at a county demonstration contest.

4. Prepare and serve outside your club meetings:

Meat — Cooked by each of the five main methods roasting, broiling, pan-broiling, braising, stewing.

Chicken — at least once.

Fish -- at least once.

Four different kinds of pie.

Four different kinds of cake.

Plain or Sweet Rolls — at least three times.

Bread - once.

Three family dinners — and plan breakfast and lunch menus for same day.

Make menus for five dinners at home.

Continue to add to your recipe file and keep record book up to date.

Exhibit foods from this unit at County 4-H Fair.

# Food Preservation

#### Canning and Freezing

Designed to teach different methods of preserving food.

#### UNIT I

#### Requirements for First Year:

- Read and use literature about canning jams and jellies, and freezing.
- 2. Use both raw pack and hot pack methods.

used in fishing and once again with rope or cord suitable to clearly show the steps taken in tying the knot. Label each knot so name can be easily read from a least five foot distance.

17. Display of at least three flies tied by member. (Fresh water dry, wet and streamer). Salt water - teaser, doodle bug, bucktail). Label and indicate kind of fish for which each is used.

# Entomology

This is a project in five yearly units designed to teach the club member basic and advanced entomology or the study of insects. The project stresses the collection, preservation, identification and exhibiting of insects, and is well-suited to the urban as well as the rural 4-H member. It also teaches recognition of harmful as opposed to beneficial insects.

6. Any other advanced insect display properly labeled.

# Woodworking

This project is designed for teaching boys and girls the proper ways of working with woodworking tools and wood, and how to properly use and care for them. The project starts with simple woodworking items, and advances to more complex articles. It is divided into beginner's and advanced units.

Each club member owns, manages and cares for one or more dairy animals and keeps feed and growth or production records. Training in judging dairy animals helps to develop initiative and judgement, the ability to think, act and speak advisedly before an audience. Dairy Club members have the opportunity to participate in county and state 4-H dairy judging contests.

# Arts and Crafts

### Dog Care

A new 4-H project, the dog project, is one in which 4-H boys and girls are taught to care for a dog of their own. The dog need not be purebred, but can be of any breed, type, or size. To be eligible for dog training, the dog must be at least three months old, and not more than four years old. All animals must be fed, trained, and otherwise cared for by the 4-H member. A dog record book must be maintained and submitted when the project is ended. Each member will exhibit his animal at the 4-H dog show at the completion of the dog care and training project.

### Automotive

In unit 111, costs and economy of cars, learning about transmissions, suspension and electrical system, highway hazards and safety are important features. Complete information on this new project can be obtained in the 4-H Club Office.

Each year 4-H clubs plan and set up their own individual club booth displays as a special feature in the main display area underneath the Raceway grandstand. These club booth exhibits have been outstanding in past years, and depict various projects and programs of local 4-H clubs. All 4-H clubs are eligible to enter one organized club exhibit in the 4-H fair.






Camp enrollments are due May 1, and the fee is \$20.





Campers have the opportunity to learn about soil, water, forestry, and wildlife in the nature and conservation class. They also learn how to identify common trees.








