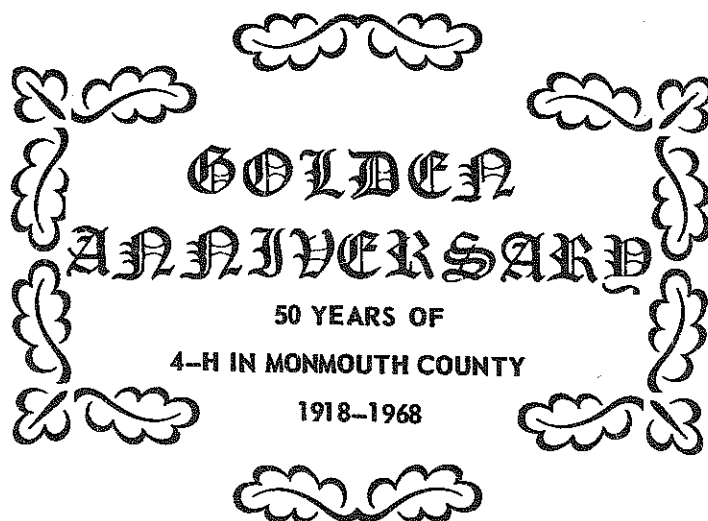
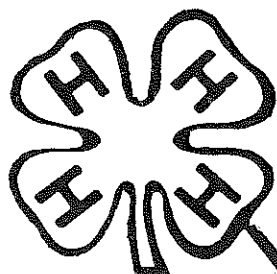


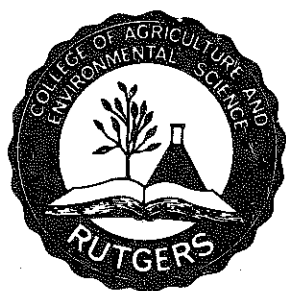

What Is The 4-H Organization?

4-H Club work is the largest organization of boys and girls in America. There are nearly two and a half million 4-H members who belong to more than 94,200 local clubs. More than 21,000,000 young people have taken part in this "learn by doing" program and have subscribed to the National 4-H motto "to make the best better."

4-H Clubs are the official youth program of the Cooperative Extension Service of Rutgers, The State University. The program is supervised by one or more 4-H agents with adult volunteer leaders serving as advisors and instructors for each local 4-H Club.

4-H Club is an organized group of five or more boys and/or girls.

Any girl or boy between the ages of 9 and 19 may become a 4-H member.

Opportunities Offered To 4-H Members

4-H members learn to work and play together in a club group. They develop a real sense of values through their projects. Members receive practical training resulting in skill and knowledge which may help them in choosing a career. 4-H'ers learn to practice good citizenship, good sportsmanship, and are given an opportunity to develop their leadership talents.

4-H'ers may attend 4-H Camp at Stokes State Forest near Branchville, N. J. Outdoor living helps to broaden their experiences and develops an understanding of the forces of nature. A program of varied activities including crafts, conservation, boating, swimming, archery, firearms safety, sports, outdoor cookery, and a variety of evening programs is provided.

Teen-age boys and girls may serve as junior leaders and may become members of the 4-H Council. Those who do excellent work are eligible for state contests and exhibits as well as trips and scholarships. All 4-H members are better equipped for adult life because of their project training and democratic club meetings.

HOME ECONOMICS EXTENSION PROGRAM

The Home Economics Extension Program provides adult education for all homemakers in Monmouth County to help them to more satisfying family life and to be wise consumers. This program is carried on directly with the homemakers or through other county agencies.

MONMOUTH COUNTY BOARD OF AGRICULTURE

The Monmouth County Board of Agriculture is the sponsoring organization for the Extension Program as a means of helping agents to make their efforts more effective for the benefit of agriculture throughout the county.

The Board of Agriculture represents farm people in legislative matters and in many other questions which have a bearing upon their lives and welfare. Its members can be proud of the fact that in some way it has benefited every farm family as well as many other people of this county. Membership is voluntary and is on an annual basis. Dues include membership in the New Jersey and American Farm Bureaus with which the Board of Agriculture is affiliated.



4-H MEMBERS LEARN BY DOING

Our 4-H Club Program is built around the principle of "learning by doing." These are some of the things all boys and girls do as part of club work:

1. **Project Work.** They accept responsibility for the decisions and work affecting the success of their enterprise.
2. **Demonstrations.** They learn to advance their ideas convincingly and to present scientific information clearly and accurately.
3. **Judging.** They practice making decisions and developing their skills of discrimination.
4. **Group Action.** They learn how to work toward group objectives and develop democratic habits and ideals.
5. **Community Service.** They carry on useful projects for the benefit of the community, and develop a sense of citizenship responsibility.
6. **Activities and Events.** They are given opportunities to enlarge their cultural, creative and aesthetic experiences.
7. **Recreation.** They learn to enjoy life, self, and association with others in wholesome social occasions and activities.

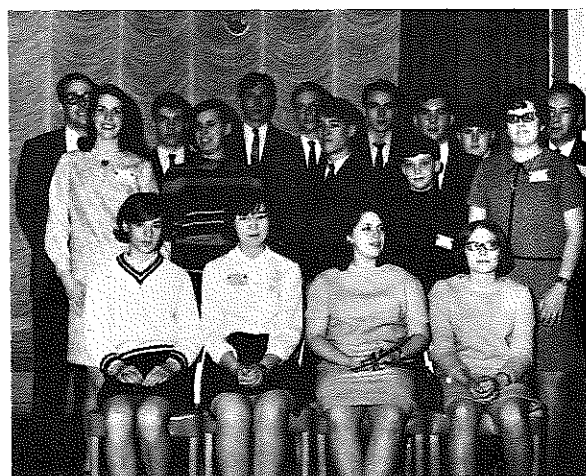


MONMOUTH COUNTY 4-H YOUTH COUNCIL

At the County Fair members run the Queen Contest, Fun Night, cake sale, and dunking stool. Members also partake in trips, tours, inter-state member exchanges and citizenship conferences.



Happy Holidays

4-H provides leadership development opportunities for youth to actively participate in groups, share committee tasks, present talks, conduct meetings and events, and share responsibilities in local, county, area and state activities and training programs.

4-H Clubs operate on the principle that all members need experience in performing leadership tasks. In the more than 95,000 local 4-H Clubs, even the youngest members are appointed to committees, are helped to develop their leadership for specific activities and take part in club meetings. More experienced members become activity or committee chairmen. Each club elects its own officers. Because a new group of officers is elected each year, more members receive the training and experience in guiding and strengthening their own 4-H programs.

More than 150,000 4-H junior or teen leaders throughout the nation work with 4-H officers and take responsible positions in cooperation with adult volunteer leaders. They help teach other members, give leadership to club activities and service projects, and they share in planning and conducting county 4-H programs.

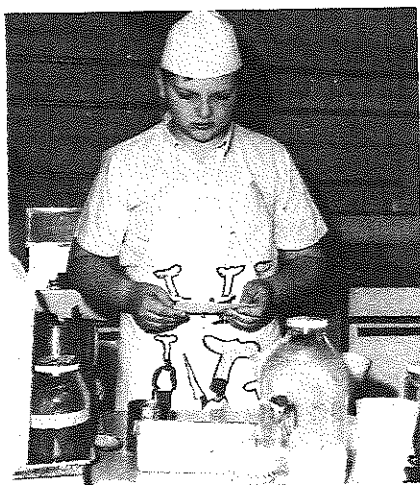

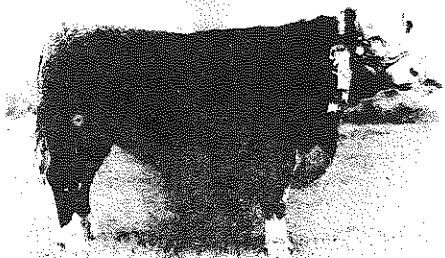

MONMOUTH COUNTY 4-H PROJECT OPPORTUNITIES

The following are brief descriptions of the objectives and educational goals of the various 4-H projects offered in Monmouth County. Complete details on any of the projects listed here may be obtained by requesting the project literature from the County 4-H Office.

4-H Fair exhibit classes are distributed to 4-H leaders and 4-H members prior to the 4-H Fair.

General Requirements

The following requirements are applicable to all of the 4-H projects listed below. The awarding of yearly achievement pins is based upon the completion of these requirements.

1. Undertake and complete one or more of the 4-H projects approved by the County 4-H Office.
2. Attend at least 70 per cent of the meetings held by the local 4-H Club.
3. Exhibit at a local or county show or give a demonstration or take part in a judging event. (Preferably all three.)
4. Keep an accurate project record and submit the record at the close of the project year.
5. Write a short story of the project experience.

Arts and Crafts

Craft projects will introduce 4-H members to a new field of activities. The individual's ability and enthusiasm is the only limiting factor in developing and pursuing an interest in crafts. A member may develop a lifelong hobby and become a near expert in a particular field, or limit himself to an acquaintance with a varied number of craft activities. Project work in crafts is offered only in such cases where qualified trained leaders are available.

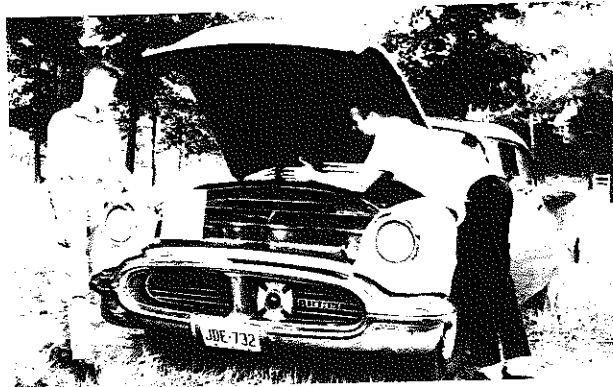

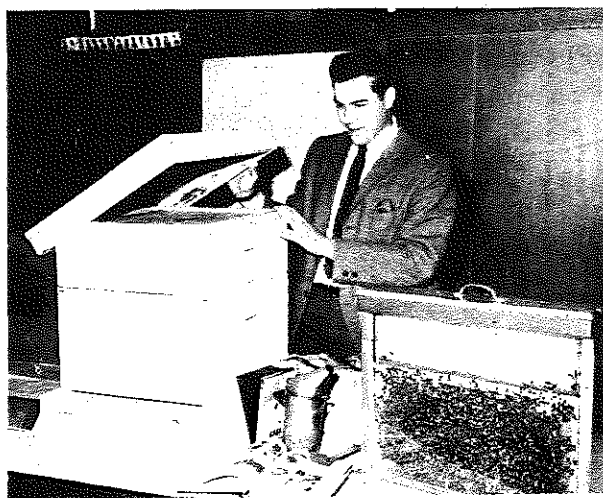

The purpose of the 4-H Automotive Program is to help the older 4-H Club member achieve the fullest opportunities as a safe and efficient automobile driver. Major emphasis is placed on safety, highway laws and regulations, car keeping, and good highway manners. Minimum age — 14 years.

BEEKEEPING



The 4-H Beekeeping Project is designed to teach youngsters to appreciate the value of the honey bee and to learn the basic fundamentals of beekeeping for fun and profit. Members learn how bees pollinate fruits, vegetables, and how honey is made and processed. They are also taught packaging and marketing of honey.

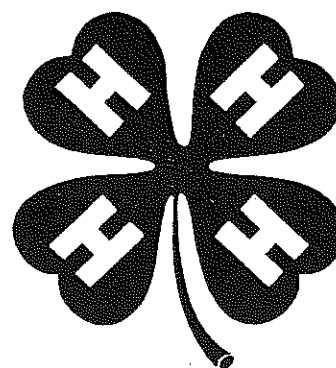

Clothing

The 4-H clothing program is designed for 4-H girls of all ages to teach not only basic skills of home sewing but to learn good value and workmanship in ready made clothes; how to plan a wardrobe; how to develop good judgment about what to buy, what to make, and how to wear clothes.

The program comprises six units, from basic skills to dressmaking and tailoring.



Dog Care & Training

The dog project is one in which 4-H boys and girls are taught to care for a dog of their own. The dog need not be purebred. To be eligible for dog training, the dog must be at least three months old, and not more than four years old. All animals must be fed, trained, and otherwise cared for by the 4-H member. A dog record book must be maintained and submitted when the project is ended. Each member will exhibit his animal at the 4-H dog show at the completion of the dog care and training project.

Seeing Eye Dog Project

This project offers young people an opportunity to help provide "eyes" for a blind person. Their love and care will help the puppy grow into a healthy, friendly dog, suitable for further training by The Seeing Eye, Inc., Morristown, N. J.

The puppy will grow up during the first 14 months of its life with a 4-H member and the family. From the home the puppy goes into training at The Seeing Eye for 3 months to prepare for its job as a guide dog. It then works for a month with its blind master at The Seeing Eye before going with him to its new home. It might be hard to give up the dog when he gets to be a year old. Perhaps so, but a club member will have the deep satisfaction of knowing that through his efforts it will be possible for some blind person to go and come as though he could see.



Dairy

Among the most successful dairy farmers in our country are many thousands who were 4-H Dairy Club members in their younger years. Not only did they learn the most scientific methods of managing Dairy Cattle, but they also discovered, through the help of their leaders and club activities, how to become good citizens. Each club member owns, manages and cares for one or more dairy animals and keeps feed and growth or production records. Training in judging dairy animals helps to develop initiative and judgement, the ability to think, act and speak advisedly before an audience. Dairy Club members have the opportunity to participate in county and state 4-H dairy judging contests.

FOOD PRESERVATION

Food preservation was one of the earliest projects in the 4-H Program. Better and safer ways of freezing and canning allow today's 4-H'ers to preserve all kinds of fruits and vegetables, jams, jellies, preserves, and relishes. Members learn to take advantage of buying products at the right season.

Beginning and advanced project units are available.

Entomology



This is a project in five yearly units designed to teach the club member basic and advanced entomology, or the study of insects. The project stresses the collection, preservation, identification, and exhibiting of insects. It is well suited to the urban as well as rural 4-H member. It also teaches recognition of harmful as opposed to beneficial insects.

FOOD PREPARATION



Every 4-H girl wants to be a good cook like mother or grandmother. Here 4-H members learn to prepare and serve foods, appreciate the importance of food to good health, personal appearance, and outlook on life.

Members acquire good buying habits and table setting techniques. They learn to recognize the prominence of food mixes and partially prepared products in today's markets as well as knowing the various methods by which one food product can be purchased and prepared.

Three project units are available to teach the member preparation of beverages, salads, vegetables, main dishes, desserts and breads.

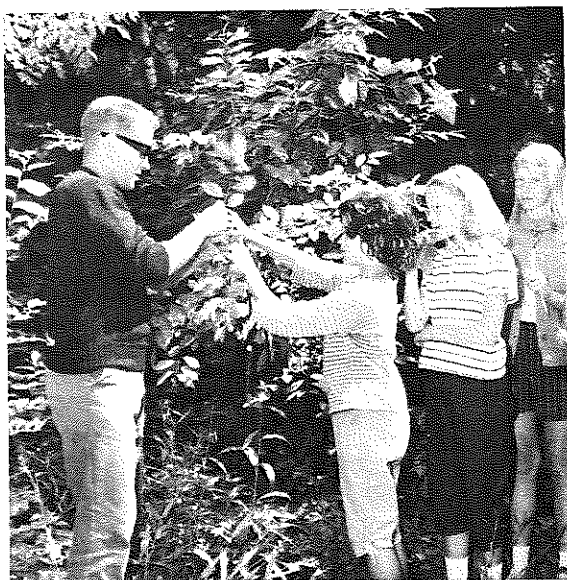

Forestry and Conservation

Young people have the greatest stake in the conservation of our forests, soil, wildlife, and streams. In four units members learn tree identification, growing forest and Christmas trees from seed, tree and shrub planting, and forest tree and Christmas tree pruning and shearing.



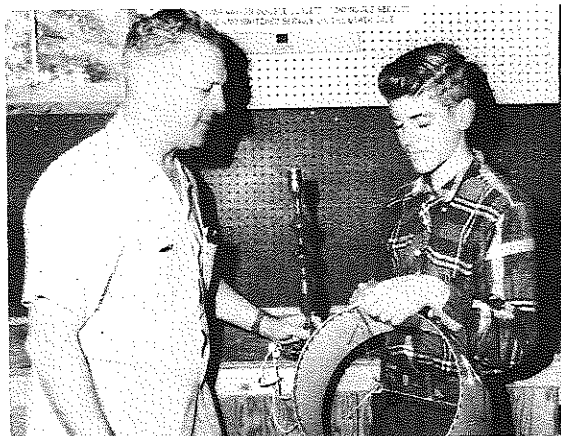
CHILD CARE

The 4-H child care project will help 4-H Club members learn more about youngsters, how they feel, act and grow. The project is divided into Junior and Senior units. Members observe and help care for young children and gain understanding of play materials, nutrition and safety.



4-H Electricity

This is a project designed in three units to acquaint 4-H members with electricity and its uses. It also is designed to teach 4-H'ers the proper use of electricity, and how it may be put to use properly and safely. The beginning unit is an introduction to electricity. The second unit is more complex, going into wiring and measuring of electricity, conductors, etc. The third unit concerns itself with electric motors, welders and advanced electricity.



Indoor Flower Gardening

The Indoor Gardening Project is designed to teach boys and girls how to grow house plants, indoor bulbs, dish gardens, terrariums, as well as to make flower arrangements, winter bouquets, Christmas decorations and corsages.

Outdoor Flower Growing

The Outdoor Flower Growing project is designed to teach boys and girls the proper way to grow annual and perennial flowers. It takes into consideration varieties, insects, diseases, and their control, as well as the combining of annuals and perennials and propagation of these plants.



GARDENING — VEGETABLES

Boys and girls who participate in the Vegetable Gardening Project soon learn that you don't need a green thumb to be a successful gardener. They know that the secret of success is to follow up-to-date information in their 4-H Vegetable Garden leaflets. The garden project can be small or large. Vegetables can be produced for home consumption, preservation, or sale.

Small Fruits

These projects include strawberries, blueberries, blackberries, raspberries and dewberries. Club members are required to plant at least 25 of any recommended variety and keep records on it for at least one year. Club members are taught varieties and culture of these fruits including control of insects and diseases, as well as marketing.

Goats

For first, second and advanced members in this project, club members are required to have one registered or grade kid, or mature doe. Feed records must be kept for one year. The objective of the project is to teach the value and importance of dairy goat management.



Horses

The purpose of the 4-H Horse Project is to teach care and management of horses or ponies and to improve horsemanship. Project divisions, ownership and requirements are listed below:

A new member who chooses the 4-H Horse Project must start one of the five divisions before he has attended four meetings. The project must be approved by your 4-H leaders, and a record book must be kept.

DIVISION A: HORSE

A mare or gelding 3 years old or older. Feed and cost records must be kept.

DIVISION B: BREEDING

One or more mares 3 years old or older that will be bred or will be rebred during the project year. Mares used in this project should be of good breeding (registered preferred) and of good conformation. The mare or mares must be bred to a registered stallion.

DIVISION C: GROWING AND TRAINING

A weanling, yearling, or 2 year old that is either raised or purchased to be grown and trained. A stallion in this project should be gelded as a yearling or as a 2-year-old. At 3 years of age, animals in this division will either go into the horse or breeding division.

DIVISION D: HORSEMANSHIP

This project is for new members who do not own or have access to a horse. A member can be in this project for only 2 years. After the two year period he must enroll in A, B, or C. Members in this division are encouraged to take riding lessons from a qualified instructor and to learn as much as possible about the care and management of the horse. These project members are ineligible to compete at county and state horse shows.

DIVISION E: JUNIOR LEADERSHIP

Gives the opportunity for leadership training. Assists leaders and members in certain areas. Must keep records, be 14 years or over, and at least in 9th grade.



Home Furnishings

A project designed to help you learn to recognize and enjoy beauty in simple everyday things around you, create beauty, recognize good design, plan and make better use of your furnishings, and develop and give demonstrations. Three units or years in home furnishings are contained in the members' guides.

Baby Beef

This project is designed to teach 4-H club members proper management of baby beef calves. Club members start with animals which are from four to six hundred pounds of purebred origin. All animals must be started prior to May 1 and preferably by January 1 of the project year. Angus, Hereford and Short-horn breeds are preferred. Complete records on feeds and feeding must be presented two weeks prior to the state 4-H baby beef show and sale. All animals must be broke to lead and be properly fitted, groomed and conditioned for the County 4-H Fair in July as well as the state show in December.



Sheep

The 4-H Sheep Project teaches club members fundamentals of sheep and lamb management and production. Club members are required to rear purebred or grade ewes and only purebred rams may be used in the 4-H flock. Records must be kept on all sheep projects and presented to the superintendent at the fair prior to exhibiting. The best time to start the project is in fall of the year with bred grade or purebred ewe, but project may also be started with purebred or grade ewe lambs in early spring. Club members may be eligible to enter fat lambs in county and state 4-H fat lamb shows and sales.

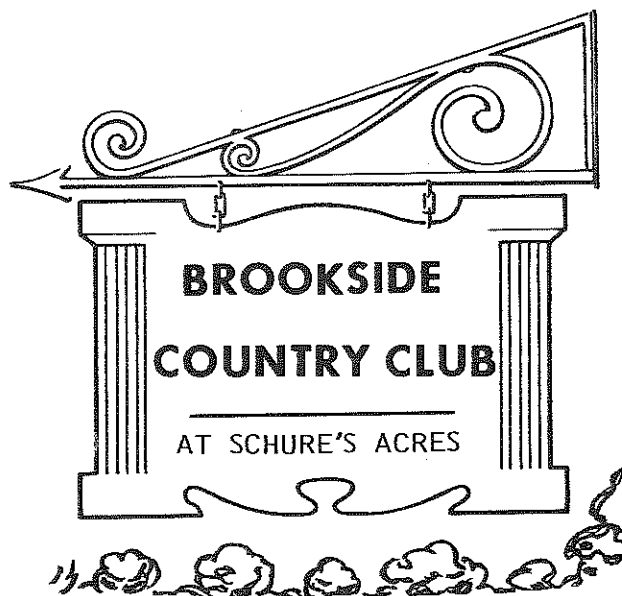

Fairs provide one of the best ways to demonstrate what a group of people — often with diverse backgrounds and interests—can do for the community good when they work together for a common goal.

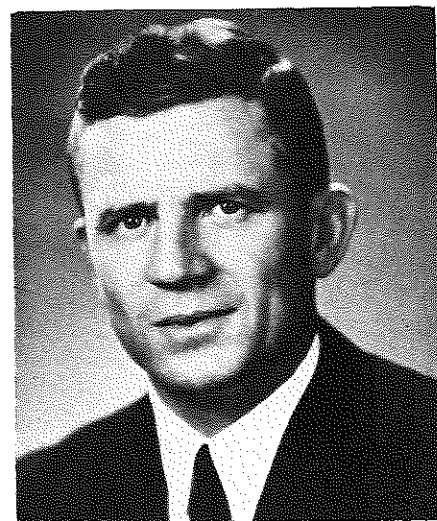

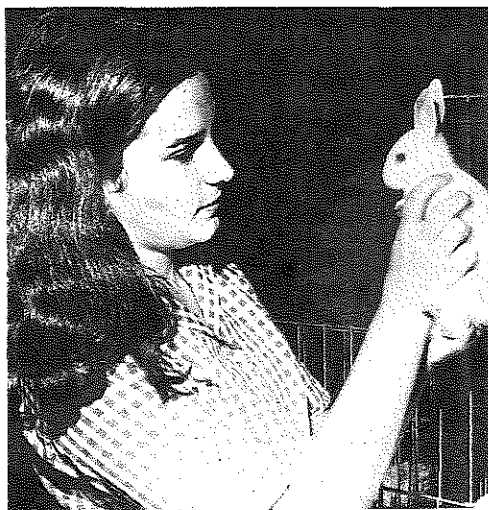
Poultry

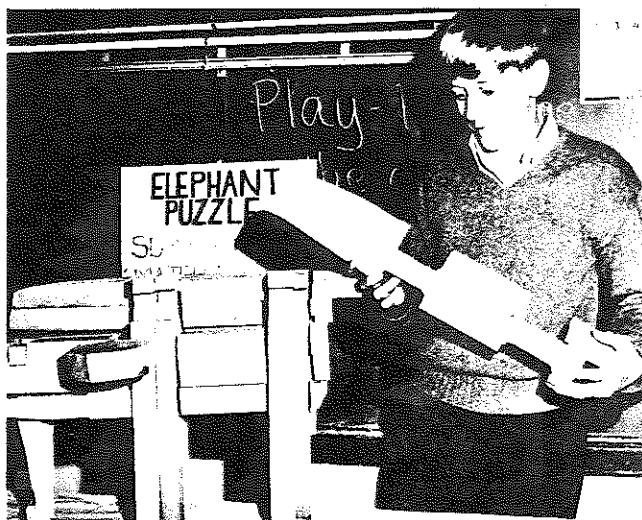


Rabbits

Club members learn proper ways of economically rearing rabbits for home use and market.



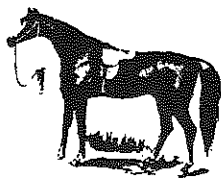

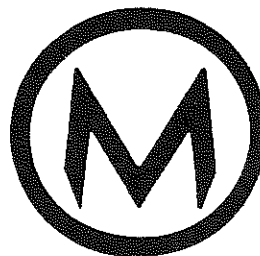

COMMUNITY BEAUTIFICATION

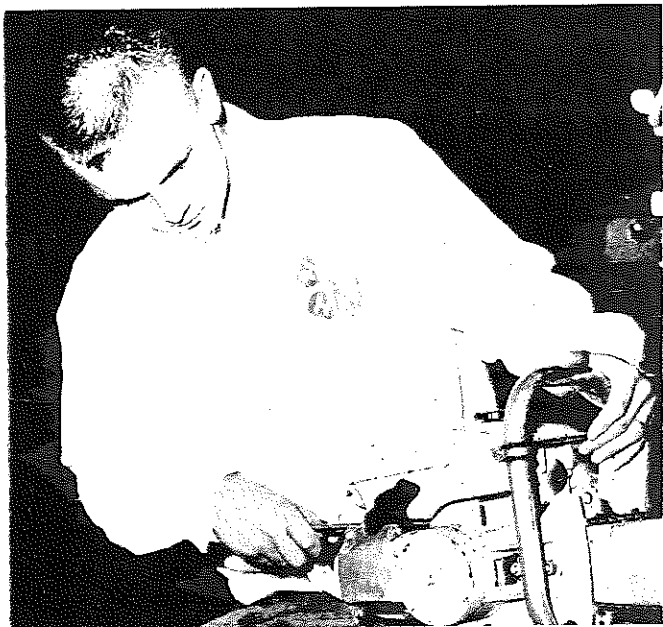

Social Know How

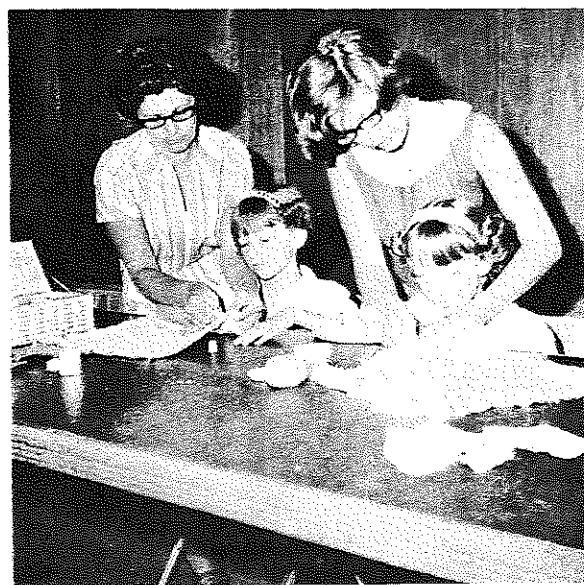
