Food Safety Modernization Act

2013 will see changes in food safety regulations with the release of the Food Safety Modernization Act proposed rules. When in the year they will be released is still not known. There is increased pressure, including lawsuits, on the Food and Drug Administration to release the rules. Even when they are released, it will be at least the end of 2013 before implementation will have much impact on New Jersey growers. Keep watching for the release and comment when they become available. There will be at least a 120-day comment period.

Food Safety/Third Party Audit Training

The immediate impact for growers in 2013 is the increased requirement by retailers to require a food safety plan and third party audits. Check with your buyers to see what audits will be accepted in 2013. We will be offering several opportunities for training in the harmonized audit. The first will be at the New Jersey Agricultural Convention and Trade Show in Atlantic City on February 7. These will be all-day trainings that will cover the harmonized audit and how to develop your food safety plan. Here are just some of the topics we will cover:

- How to develop a risk assessment for the farm
- Writing standard operating procedures
- Harmonized audit questions for field production and harvesting
- Harmonized audits for packing, storage and transportation

We will have exercises where growers have the opportunity to write a basic risk assessment and a standard operating procedure. There will be questions from the harmonized audits where each person will be able to give their opinion whether the example is in compliance or that needs to make changes in the operation. This will be a very interactive session. Come prepared to participate!

New Jersey Agricultural Convention and Trade Show

This is the second year of the combined New Jersey Vegetable Meeting and the New Jersey Agricultural Convention. Growers have the opportunity to attend both events the same week. The agricultural convention will have listening sessions for all agricultural producers on current issues which impact the industry. Growers who are members of the New Jersey Vegetable Growers Association should have received information before Christmas concerning the meeting; if not go to www.njveggies.org or contact Rocky DiGerolamo at 856-797-1686. The preliminary program for the vegetable meeting is included at the end to this newsletter. Delegates to the Agricultural Convention should be getting information from the New Jersey Department of Agriculture (NJDA). If you have not received lodging and meal information contact the NJDA.

You can access the renewal process through your status page at the ProFACT web site. After renewing, you can then print your 2013 certificate.

The renewal process for Trained Fertilizer Applicators is currently being enhanced and will go online in January 2013.
